



We thank our community for their growing support by donating and shopping in the Thrift Store, which **funds 50% of our operating budget.** Even amongst constant change our customers offer kind and grateful feedback for a store that values health and safety and provides an option in this time of such economic challenge for many.

And as always, a big thank you to all our volunteers! Our Volunteer Appreciation event in April was one of our largest and most joyous ever, with happy faces greeting each other again, and smiles seen everywhere. The generosity of our community remains high and you raised over \$4000. at our annual Christmas events Celebrate a Life and Time to Remember, a 50% increase from our prior year. We will continue to be there for you all and serve our community with compassion and empathy.

FUNDING AND REVENUE



TREASURER'S REPORT

The 2022 fiscal year was another interesting year for Hospice financially as, for a second year in a row, there was a surplus of revenue over expenditures. For 2022 this surplus was just over \$60,000. Overall revenue was higher than budget by approximately \$48,000. The Thrift Store continues to be a great success and an important source of income for the Society. Well done to all the staff and volunteers who worked so hard to continue operations, and exceed expectations, through these unexpected times. Turning to the expense side, overall expenses were \$40,000 less than budget. This was due to lower than budgeted wages, along with a reserve set aside that was not needed for repairs and maintenance. Wage expense was lower than anticipated largely because a grant subcontractor was not hired as initially planned.

Lastly, fundraising income was lower than budget. This was expected as Hospice minimized fundraising activities due to COVID. With the easing of restrictions for 2023, the ability to raise income through fundraising has resumed and will provide another source of resources. As Hospice slowly returns to full operations, the level of reserves held has put the Society in a comfortable position for the year ahead.

PALLIATIVE AND END-OF-LIFE

This year was one of assessment and re-building for our palliative programs which include one-to-one support, hospice visiting, and Relaxation Circle.




McKenney Creek Hospice Volunteers

A core group of volunteers have returned to support dying people and their loved ones with courage, compassion and a level of dedication which is unsurpassed. In 2021-22, the visitor policy in long-term care and Hospice seemed to change monthly and volunteers responded with such patience and grace.



Relaxation Circle

Health and Safety for both volunteers and participants remained a top priority and Relaxation Circle group numbers were kept smaller to maintain distancing and comfort levels. We offered four groups with **26 participants** and **136 volunteer hours.**



GRIEF AND LOSS

Grief Groups in Long-term care

Our on-site grief groups for seniors living in long-term care and assisted living have had a truly successful inaugural year. We have established groups at **three local care homes** and offer monthly groups for residents. Thank you to the volunteers who have committed to this program to support seniors who were grieving in isolation and could not access our office for programs.



Traumatic and Sudden Loss

Our referrals in this area have grown by **15% in the last year. 44 people** came to the Hospice Society for grief support for a suicide, homicide, or drug-use death. Our first Traumatic and Sudden loss grief group was offered in January of 2021.

Refresher Training for Grief Volunteers

It was very encouraging to have **twelve volunteers** return to ervice in this area. The need for this specialized grief support continues to grow and this will remain an area of focus for raining and our volunteers in the coming year. In October 2022 we are hosting our first intake and volunteer training since 2019





HOSPICE SOCIETY THRIFT STORE

2021–2022 brought the true gift of reassurance and confidence that the unwavering commitment to health and safety for our staff, volunteers and customers had made a truly positive impact. All areas of store metrics, from our growing customer base, to volunteer hours, to monthly sales have seen an increase. All time revenue highs were set for the store with the team seeing both their highest daily sales recorded and highest month of revenue ever. We offered our first store –wide sale and the community responded, again with the highest sale day to date! We thank our community to adapting to our modified donation days and hours as this ensures a safe and manageable system of processing your fabulous and much-needed donations. We cannot express our gratitude enough to this amazing team and their leadership from Maureen. Our volunteers have returned, to a level we could not have anticipated. New volunteers have joined the team and we welcome them aboard.

This year we continued our focus on the health and safety for our store team through a number of new initiatives. We installed security cameras at the store to record illegal dumping and vandalism and this has significantly deterred this on-going problem. We hired an external violence in the workplace company to offer our staff strategies and procedures to deal with challenging customers. This year too, it was also so encouraging to re-engage with community partners like the Downtown Maple Ridge BIA for the Car Boot sale this summer. Thank you again to our customer and donors for helping us to provide our community with our no-cost programs and supports







COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT



Time to Remember at St. George's church in December 2021 returned in-person and was attended by over 100 community members. Thank you to all who volunteered to make this return to inperson possible! This memorial evening recognizes the complexity of grief during the holiday season and is an important avenue for healing for many who attend.

Celebrate a Life was successfully offered at both the Thrift Store and in Valley Fair Mall. Our hummingbird campaign was a hit once again and contributed to successful Christmas fundraising.





Community outreach and education remined a priority. Thanks to volunteer Jane for working at the **Senior's Resource Fair.**

Lindsey presented at the **Caregiver's Cafe** at Golden Ears United Church in July 2022. We refer many of our clients who are caregivers of someone living with illness or dementia to this valuable community group.
